



# **SYNOPSIS**

### Prelude:

Introduction to Froebel and the gifts

# **Movement 2:**

Sphere, Cylinder, and Cube Lesson: Essentially, they were used to help children discover a unity of the forms throughout their world. They could first practice comparing the three shapes to different objects. Then, they could spin the shapes to realize that each shape can actually be found within the other: When the cube is spun it looks like a cylinder, when the cylinder is spun it looks like a sphere. This would effectively lay the foundation for creative exploration and learning.

#### Movement 1:

Yarn Balls

Lesson: To help children begin to distinguish form, color, and movement.

# **Movement 3:**

**Building Blocks** 

Lesson: This gift would present the simple idea of parts making up a whole and how when one of those parts is taken away, the whole is no longer whole. It would emphasize the possibilities of what all those parts can become when creatively combined in different ways.

# **Movement 4:**

Parquetry Tablets

Lesson: With these 2D shapes, each of which is derived from the surfaces of the previous 3D shapes, children could now begin to shift from the real to the abstract by arranging them into different patterns, shapes, and images.

## Movement 6:

Framework Gift

Lesson: With this gift, kids are able to creatively combine the abstract concepts of points and lines to recreate the framework of the solid forms. Kids have now moved from the concrete to the abstract and back to the concrete. It's the beginning of understanding how one's own abstract thoughts and ideas can be recreated in the world outside one's brain.

#### **Movement 5:**

The Point

Lesson: This gift highlights yet another aspect of the 3D prism: the points of intersection. With this gift, kids are encouraged to create their own creative images using these points, helping them to understand the concepts of space and distance and how they relate to form and the world around them.

# Conclusion:

Clay

Lesson: The block of clay, being malleable but solid, could be shaped into virtually any form and thus allow for endless possibilities.
